PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

ello, everyone! It's been a long summer, but the judging phase of the Arizona Authors Literary Contest will soon wrap up, and then we'll start tabulating and choosing finalists! Each entry will be judged by at least three judges, selected from the Arizona Authors Association membership and other professionals. If you have an entry in the contest, please don't get discouraged if you don't win. Two judges might love your work, but if the third doesn't, they might eliminate you from the running. The important part is to keep writing!

Scores are very, very close this year. I have no doubt that the grand prize winner will be decided by about a quarter of a percentage point. Competition was especially tough this year due to a 45 percent increase in entries over the previous year. Our judges have been working very hard; some of them have judged more than a dozen entries! I thank them sincerely, because we desperately needed the help.

Once the finalists are chosen, I will notify each contestant of their status around mid-September. I will then begin working on the 2026 Arizona Authors Literary Magazine, which is expected to be available for purchase on Amazon in late October. This will be a busy few months for me, so please forgive me if I don't respond to emails or web pages as quickly as I usually do. Good luck, contestants!

This month, the Arizona Authors Association is sponsoring Part Two of Daniel Dickinson's workshop on In-Person Events. It will be held online on August 9 at 10 a.m. via Zoom. If you haven't registered yet, you can do so here. Even if you missed the first part, the second will still be very helpful. You'll learn all the techniques to make your in-person book signings and festival appearances successful.

Part One is on our <u>website's resource page</u>. Just scroll past the Digest archive into the videos section, and you'll see it at the top. You might want to watch Part 1 before registering for Part 2, but it's not required.

Last month, the Arizona Authors Association participated in the Payson Book Festival. We had so many authors interested in taking part that we ended up purchasing a second eight-foot table. This was the first recent time the Arizona Authors Association took part in the event, but Jane Ruby, our Vice President, has been attending for years. Fortunately, we managed to place our two tables right next to hers in a prime spot in the auditorium.

The Payson Festival is one of many events in which the Arizona Authors Association will participate. Last year was the first time we sponsored a table in Green Valley in November. A misunderstanding (on my part) prevented us from using that table last year, but you can bet we will do so this year! We already have four volunteers ready.

In 2026, we aim to expand into Prescott and Flagstaff. With the addition of both Southern and Northern Arizona Coordinators, we now have a presence statewide and plan to grow further. Let us know if you'd like us to attend a book event in a community near you, and the Board will consider the suggestion at the next meeting.

It's turning out to be a fantastic summer! Many thanks to our judges, Daniel for his workshops, and all the members who participated in the Payson event. Also, thanks to Kyle Patton for his wonderful work with the Digest.

The Arizona Authors Association is really going places, and I'm grateful to be part of the journey. *Peace*,







LOOKING FOR ROUND ROBIN CRITIQUE **GROUP LEADERS**

We're seeking volunteers to lead round-robin critique groups, either by email or through group chats on our website. (With Wix transitioning from forums to groups in October, this is a great opportunity to kick off the new format!) All you need is an internet connection. (A round robin critique group is a small circle of writers who take turns sharing their work and providing feedback on each other's submissions in a set order.)

Each round-robin group will include up to six members, including the leader, to keep things manageable. If we have enough volunteers, we plan to launch the groups early next year and open them up for member sign-ups. As a leader, you'll guide up to five other authors. Your role will include introducing yourself, assigning numbers (1-6) based on last names in alphabetical order, and kicking off the first round the following week.

Each week, a different author will share a chapter or short story with the group. Everyone else will provide feedback on that submission, building on each other's comments so all members benefit. The cycle continues each week for six weeks, then starts over with Author #1.

Leaders are responsible for reminding members to submit their work, ensuring everyone receives each submission and critique, and helping maintain participation. If someone drops out or stops participating, you may recruit a replacement by posting in the Digest.

This role is perfect for someone willing to lead a small group and commit to weekly communication. Ready to help? Email me ArizonaAuthorsAssociation@gmail.com and I'll add you to our volunteer list. If there's enough interest, we'll launch in 2026. Thank you!

May 26


Over Memorial Day Weekend, D.R. Ransdell returned to Springfield, Illinois, to speak at the International Carillon Society. Her road trip novel Carillon Chase—winner of the 2022 Arizona Authors Award—follows protagonist Campanello's adventures around the city's iconic Thomas Rees Memorial Carillon, one of the largest bell towers in the U.S. This year's festival featured carillonists from the Netherlands, Belgium, Chicago and Springfield, MO-but D.R. was the only author in attendance!

June 25

On June 25, the Scottsdale Society of Women Writers hosted journalist Sherry Sklar at Chompie's in Scottsdale. Sklar shared her journey from high-profile editorial roles to community journalism, offering insights on writing with purpose and resilience. s a new member of the Arizona Authors Association, having recently arrived in Tucson from Sioux City and formerly Ames, Iowa, I am working on a mystical historical novel. While exploring the Feather River region of the Sierra Nevada, I became enraptured by gold fever. Research included time with modern gold hunters dredging (vacuuming) the bottom of the Feather River for gold (I can now write about hypothermia), exploring Rich Bar discovery site, viewing ancient petroglyphs, getting lost often, visiting museums and musty bookstores and locating a rare copy of Fariss & Smiths History of Plumas, Lassen, and Sierra Counties, California (1883) the

historical version of the fruitless search for "Gold Lake" inspiring my novel, The Gold Hunter.

I also visited the Paiutes of Pyramid Lake Nevada, who play a big role in this story and the Hall visited Records in Carson City, Nevada. for Paiute names found only in early census records. The Gold Hunter will be published by Sunstone Press (Santa Fe, New Mexico). A young man



discovers that the entrance to the California Mother Lode has been kept secret for centuries by the Old Ones and is guarded by Indians. My short story, The Return of Wyatt, Billy and Doc, will appear this August in Aces and Eights and Unmarked Graves, internationally published by Saddlebag Dispatches, a full-color, high-quality magazine for Western fiction and nonfiction. In this short story, it appears the famous gunmen have returned in 1967 Los Angeles to make amends for their previous deeds.

I began writing on a black Royal typewriter that weighed fifty pounds when "copy and paste" meant using scissors and white glue to make editorial changes. I graduated from San Jose State College in 1971 with a degree in journalism and worked briefly for the Omaha World Herald before realizing I had no talent for news. Instead, I began working hard. Building bridges, houses and hospitals with a hunger for physical work to fuel imaginary work. Later, I became a Teamster and drove through blizzards and tornadoes. It taught me to deliver my payload no matter what.

Every morning, I devoted the first three hours to writing before going to work. Writing. Then rewriting. Then more rewriting. Did I mention rewriting? Writing is a long road.


My very first story was about a caveman named Uk who comforts his wife during a solar eclipse. She is terrified. When the sun returns, she thinks he has restored the sun miraculously. The last line of the

story is her exclaiming, "Oh, Uk!" I was in the fifth grade. I've been trying to improve my writing ever since. In the eighth grade, I defeated the smartest girl in class in a spelling bee contest by correctly spelling "laryngitis." Then I knew I wanted to be a novelist, but knowing how to spell is only the start. The great thing about writing is you never have to retire.

I am enjoying being a first-time judge in the AAA annual writing contest. The writing entries are amazing, and I am proud to be a part of this group. My wife and I are new snowbirds, flying between Iowa, Montreal, and Tucson to visit our children and

arandchildren in our first motorhome. I believe grandchildren keep you young and full of joy. And so does writing.

PURPOSE

Practical advice for the traveling creative

By Jeanne Burrows-Johnson



Summer often calls authors and artists on the move. From planning multi-stop trips to prepping materials, managing transportation, and choosing where to stay, it's all making your journey worthwhile and a little less stressful. With checklists, anecdotes, and gentle reminders, this article encourages creative travelers to be prepared, stay flexible and travel with purpose.

TIME TO TRAVEL

If you are a regular traveler (for personal pleasure or professional necessity), you may have a travel agent who assists you with scheduling and paying for your ventures beyond home. For authors, the financial restraints on literary agents and publishers have reduced the opportunities for our travel expenses to be covered.

Depending on where we live, there may be many opportunities to present ourselves (and our wares) close to home. When we need to travel beyond our own vehicle (or that of a friend or family member), planes, trains and/or the reliable bus might be the best way to reach our destination(s).

I pluralize that last point because I have found that the effort required to make more than one stop on a journey often proves to be the most productive and cost-effective choice.

YOUR VENUE DIRECTS YOUR PREPARATION FOR **TRAVEL**

When I visited my hometown of Portland, Oregon, just before COVID struck, I tried to make the most of the time, effort, and money I invested. At that time, my high school graduating class was celebrating its 50th reunion. With that as the unexpected impetus for my trip, I sought additional motives for my journey. The first stop I considered was a layover in California to meet the delightful artist who works with me on the Natalie Seachrist Hawaiian Mysteries. Unfortunately, that wasn't possible.

Next, when I was unable to arrange a speaking engagement at a Portland bookstore, I contacted my high school and scheduled two days of speaking engagements in English classes. I was also fortunate that my editor helped me connect with a book club affiliated with a professional women's organization. And, of course, I attended my graduation event and caught up with friends I hadn't seen in a while.

WHAT TO TAKE?

Regardless of gender or age, I recommend keeping the most important items on your person or in what is typically called "carry-on" luggage. You may need to check with your transportation provider about this... and another reason why a travel agent can be

helpful: Is there space for your carry-on items? Will they be stored in overhead compartments, or beneath a passenger in front of you? And will you have to pay an extra fee? Actually, is there a limit on the number of pieces of luggage or their weight that you can bring?

Another vital issue is the materials you might need for events. Will you need to create one or more displays? Will participants or audience members expect you to have handouts with an outline of a presentation and flyers about your books or other items for sale? Will you have a chance to collect contact information from those people?

What materials should you refer to when giving a public address or offering a seminar? If you are to be introduced by someone, send a short bio (including the topic of the day) ahead of your arrival. Keep in mind that things can always go wrong, so bring a couple of hard copies of handouts and a brief statement for introducing yourself.

There is always a possibility that printed materials may not arrive with you on time...even if you mailed or shipped them in advance. Therefore, I carry both master copies and thumb drives with carefully labeled files that will enable me to print anything I need once I arrive at my destination.

THE JOURNEY ITSELF

Perhaps the single most useful tip is to travel well before any event you're scheduled to attend, especially since, as I'm sure we've all experienced, travel today can be quite frustrating unless cost isn't a concern. Whether you're driving yourself or someone else is, there are issues like packing enough luggage (and presentation materials), checking the latest weather reports and road conditions (and restrictions), finding gas or charging stations, locating food, and handling restroom needs.

Since I easily suffer from motion sickness, I never consider taking a trip by bus or train. After some research, I found an airline that offered excellent departure and arrival times and a good rate for traveling in business class.

My next concern was ground transportation in Portland. With my editor's help for most

appointments, I decided not to rent a car or use a ride-share service. Instead, I opted for cabs for three trips during my week-long visit. This was simple because I booked my first night in a hotel near the airport, which provided transportation.

For the remaining days and nights of my trip, I booked a hotel for several reasons. Although it was too far to provide transportation back to the airport, they did offer local transport to nearby stores and restaurants. That meant I was able to purchase beverages and snacks to pass the time between meals, and I was able to meet friends for lunch. Another great benefit was that they offered "accessible rooms," which, even if one doesn't need facilities meeting the Americans with Disabilities Act, can make the experience of being away from home more comfortable.

In the future, we can talk about displays and handouts, and how to best present yourself!

SUMMARY OF TRAVEL CONSIDERATIONS

- Ship books and marketing materials in advance if possible—to a friend, organization, or your hotel and make sure you visit with the recipient beforehand.
- Allow at least one full day for preparation and rest prior to each event.
- Purchase travel tickets that will permit you to change your schedule.
- Plan ground transportation that minimizes strain on you, as well as cost.

- Hotels often offer airport transportation, valets, safes and restaurants. Short-term rentals or homesharing services (such as Airbnb) may offer less privacy than a hotel. A bed and breakfast might be a good choice when you're driving.
- Financially, notify credit card companies that you be traveling. Obtain cash in different denominations for simple payments and tips. Find out if you need a tax or sales license for events you plan to participate in. Decide whether to accept credit cards, other electronic payments, or cash for sales. What type of receipts will you provide? Where will you store the cash you receive?
- Carry emergency clothing, accessories, medicines, vitamins, and toiletries in hand-held bags in case checked luggage does not arrive.
- Personally carry hard copies of masters and electronic files for reproducing printed materials that are important for any event in which you will participate.
- Dress to attract positive attention (and any needed assistance) while traveling—wear a name badge on your jacket, carry bookmarks, business cards, and tip money ready in your pocket!



THE MILLION MILE WALKER

WHAT WE'RE **READING AND WHY**

met Nancy Hicks Marshall at a conference of Arizona Professional Writers, and over lunch, we recognized our common interest in immigration politics. My focus was on Guatemala, and hers was on Arizona. Although her book is fiction, it's based on the events surrounding "America's Toughest Sheriff," Sheriff Arpaio, who served as sheriff of Maricopa County from 1993 to 2016. I met Arpaio at a wedding where I was the best man, and he seemed like a jovial, personable guy. He gained national attention on a segment on 60 Minutes, which highlighted Tent City, pink underwear, illegal immigration sweeps and traffic stops targeting Latinos. Behind this amiable façade was a darker reality, which Marshall unravels in her book, A Dry Hate: Power Versus the People.

The book offers a compelling examination of Arizona's immigration politics, viewed through the lens of civil liberties and constitutional rights while exploring the dynamics between institutional power and individual rights. It uses Arizona's immigration enforcement policies to understand how democratic institutions can be weaponized against vulnerable populations.

The author's story explores the consequences of Arizona's controversial immigration laws, examining how political opportunism intersects with public concerns about border security. Marshall's focus remains steadfast on the constitutional implications of these policies, particularly their impact on Fourth Amendment protections against unreasonable searches and seizures, as well as Fourteenth Amendment guarantees of equal protection under the law.

Revered journalist and news anchor Walter Cronkite is often quoted, and the Cronkite Auditorium at Arizona State University is the backdrop for many scenes depicting the role of the media in shaping public understanding of political issues. invocation of Cronkite's integrity serves as an inspiration and contrast to the current communications practices.



Marshall's motivation for writing the book stemmed from an incident in 2008 when she bailed out a young man from jail after he was arrested for applauding at a public meeting. When she watched a video of the arrest, she began to appreciate how one elected official (the Sheriff) with so many at his beck and call could abuse his power. The book represents a balance between readability and scholarly vigor. Her tenure as director of the Arizona Civil Liberties Union provided insight into the legal challenges arising from the State's immigration policies.

Towards the end of the book, the section on "Propaganda Techniques and Political Analysis" provides a framework for analyzing the impact of immigration policies on the distribution and exercise of political power. It highlights the rhetorical strategies employed by various political actors to advance their broader agendas. By examining how immigration became a tool for political mobilization, Marshall helps us understand how politicians can manipulate democratic institutions to serve narrow partisan interests rather than the broader public welfare.

Although published in 2012, the book was updated and republished in 2023, allowing the author to incorporate the results of ongoing political debates and the outcomes of various court cases. The reallife sheriff was convicted of criminal contempt of court, and although President Trump pardoned him, his actions cost Maricopa County taxpayers more than \$300 million in legal fees.

The author was able to include more details on how Arizona's immigration policies became the testing ground for broader questions about civil liberties, due process, and the limitations of power, making it especially timely given today's ongoing debate and civil strife around how to deal with immigration.

Marshall's writing is highly readable and succeeds in making complex constitutional and political issues understandable to a general audience while maintaining sufficient analytical rigor to inform policy discussions. Her passion for justice and human rights drives a narrative that combines legal analysis with human interest-based storytelling. The book represents both historical documentation and contemporary analysis, contributing to the ongoing debate on the proper balance between security concerns and constitutional rights in our democracy.

The laptop was dusted off, an ink cartridge was inserted in the printer, and my editor went on full alert. The Wye Tree was born. I hope you enjoy it because I enjoyed writing it.

A WRITER'S TIP

FROM KAREN ODDEN

THE SEVEN **KINDEST WORDS**

ome years ago, my friend Donna (kudos coming, D) and I were sharing stories about parenting, and she told me how there was a day she was rushing her two boys to get out the door, and one of them began having a full-on meltdown, as children do.

She halted herself in her tracks and said, "Honey, take all the time you need." The meltdown drew down several notches, and they got out the door, shoes, backpacks, and all. (Yes, I totally poached her approach for my own kids.)

That little story stuck with me because I felt something tip inside my own chest at the moment Donna said those words. They stirred up an ache. Because they were words I needed to hear myself.

Here's a question. How many of us felt rushed as children? Hurry up and get your shoes on, hurry up and get out the door for school (or practice, or the dentist appointment, or whatever), hurry up and grow up. I'm not blaming parents. Good grief, parenting is a full-on, busy endeavor, involving multitasking, conflicting needs, and bad traffic at exactly the wrong time. But I think it's important to recognize when myths and messages imbibed in childhood are no longer relevant or helpful.

This old pattern of "hurry up!" with the concurrent feeling of Dire Urgency (those caps are intentional) does not work well when it comes to writing. It makes me want to have a meltdown and throw my shoes against the wall. Paradoxically, the more I try

to rush—the more attuned to some external clock and not the innermost feelings and thoughts of my characters—the less I get done and the blander and deader my prose becomes. I might as well go to the kitchen and start dinner.

All this said, I am in the middle of editing my sixth book, and when I received my editor's notes, I felt a moment of that Hurry Up Dire Urgency. (To be clear, it was not on her part; it was all in my head.) I took a breath.

I reminded myself: these are edits on a book, not a life-saving medical treatment. And in fact, I have time-plenty of time. Weeks. Just because I have a deadline doesn't mean it's an unreasonable one. And in fact ... I think my deadline is sometime in August, so ... I'm good.

Deadlines are a matter of life, because other people are depending on us to finish our part of the project so they can get to theirs.

But I guess my musing for today is this: the mentality of "Honey, take all the time you need," can help us push back at the personal myth that rushing is better and will get us wherever we're going faster, or that some external schedule necessarily strips us of our ability to create.

At any rate, wherever you are in your process, I wish you happy writing! As always, thank you for being part of my reading and writing community! I'm grateful to you all. Happy summer!

I told my characters to start behaving how I wanted them to.


