

We also offer online book fairs or other events through our Zoom account. Advertising under the Arizona Authors Association banner allows you to promote your work and increase your visibility with a minimum of expense and effort.

I hope you will take advantage of the digest to report your accomplishments. Our "Congratulations" page is designed to applaud your efforts and inspire other members. We also welcome your input on anything author related, such as your own literary news, useful tips, helpful websites, etc. Ask questions that will be answered in the next issue. Together, we will all benefit from the combined knowledge of our diverse membership.

Road to Imagination seeks finished works of 800 words or less based upon the previous issue's story prompt. Back Page Quotes seeks jokes or quotes (200 words or less) on the foibles of writing, editing or publishing. We also need Arizona landscape photos, as inspiring space fillers for our newsletter. If we use them, we'll credit you. Please be sure to state in your email that you took the photos.

If you published a book within the last six months, share it with the Arizona Authors Digest. We'd love to advertise it in our next issue. We will also list any upcoming book-related events, meetings, workshops, book sales, book signings, etc., across the state or in nearby regions as space permits. If you offer editing, proofreading, or other literary services, submit a quarterpage ad with us, currently without cost to members in good standing.

Note that all submissions are subject to light editing/proofreading. You will be informed in advance of publication if extensive edits are needed.





Vince Bailey's *Curtis Jefferson* Metaphysical Fiction series (*Path of the Half Moon*, *Courses of the Cursed*, and *Merging Paths*) was awarded the 2022 Grand Prize for a Fiction Series at the Chanticleer International Book Awards conference in Bellingham, Washington, last year. The series follows the real and supernatural survival struggles of Curtis Jefferson, a 15-year old African-American youth who is unfairly sentenced to a year in the notorious detention center, Fort Grant.



In addition to the series' award, the third book, *Merging Paths*, was named winner in the 17th annual National Indie Excellence Awards for the regional (Southwest) fiction category.





Arizona Authors Election

For the next two issues, we will be promoting participation in the **Arizona Authors Association Board Election**, asking for candidates for leadership as well as support positions. All offices are open, so throw your hat in the ring and become a board member! **Candidates will be featured in the next issue.** We can't do this job without you; with Toby slowing down, Jane and Kathleen are overwhelmed. We'll need help in the coming year if we are to continue our 45-year legacy. Thank you!!

Open Board Positions:

Leadership Positions (Two-years minimum membership)

President: Oversees policy and administration, collects and distributes funds, chairs meetings, and advises all other departments. (Must have served at least one year as a current or past board member.)

Vice President: Assists the president in all tasks and assumes the role of acting president when necessary. Provides secondary oversight in the collection and distribution of funds and in the overall departments.

Treasurer: Keeps an record of all incoming receipts and outgoing expenditures in the bank/PayPal accounts. Makes available to board members a bylaws-required ledger that is updated monthly.

Secretary: Keeps minutes of board meetings, copies of all important documents, treasurer's accounting reports, and a membership roster (updated monthly). Answers emails and communicates with board members and membership about events, digest entries, and meetings.

Contest Director: Directs the Annual Literary Contest, works with volunteer judges, keeps track of all entries and payments, and ensures each entry is counted and judged by a panel of judges. The CD also calculates scores to determine winners, submits copies of score sheets to the Secretary, and keeps the membership informed of contest updates, rules, finalists and winners. Co-hosts (with the Events Director) the annual awards banquet.

Support Positions (One-year minimum membership)

Membership Director: Prepares and updates membership records and gives copies monthly (if any changes made) to the Secretary. Works with President/VP to grow membership.

Literary Magazine Editor: Compiles winning contest entries, edits, and prepares the annual Arizona Literary Magazine.

Zoom Director: Plans, hosts and schedules all online events, such as the Zoom workshops, and works with presenters. **Events Director:** Promotes, hosts, and directs all physical events, such as the Tucson Festival of Books, in-person workshops or book fairs, etc. Also co-hosts, with the Contest Director, the Literary Awards Banquet.

Website Administrator: Oversees the website and updates the calendar, contest info, member pages, etc.

Arizona Authors Digest Editor: Compiles submissions, edits and distributes the bimonthly Arizona Authors Digest.

LITERARY CONTEST REPORT

As of the contest's close, we have received 138 Entries:

Fiction – 27
Nonfiction - 35

We raised \$4155 in entry fees (after PayPal fees were deducted) but after setting aside money for payouts (\$1225), we netted approximately \$2930. Nevertheless this is by far the largest # of entries I've handled as contest director, working by myself to organize the contest, answer emails, find judges and distribute entries to the judges, and finally, to determine and notify the winners.

I've had a few glitches with our new system. Some entrants checked the box and agreed to the rules, but never read or complied with them.

A few examples:

Poetry entries over the 50-line limit Unpublished Entries with author's name included in the text. Entry without payment by deadline Payment without entry by deadline Entry without PDF file by deadline

These last three were awkward to validate because of the three-step process. I gave entrant notification of noncompliance and a chance to correct entries ONLY BECAUSE this was our first year doing digital entries. Next year, only those authors who successfully submit a correct entry (all three steps) will receive a notification of completion. If any step is left incomplete by the contest deadline, the contestant will forfeit their chance to win a prize.

Getting adequate judges has also been challenging. I was fortunate to recruit a few new members with editing expertise. But their numbers came up short with the increased # of entries. The OBD category has been most challenging because some OBD judges prefer fiction to non-fiction etc., and OBG contains many genres that I didn't have time to review. Yikes.

Now it's your turn. Go forth and write!






The Million Mile Walker Review What We're Reading and Why

A librarian friend found this book for me in preparation for our first visit to the Chaco Canyon. As we drove down the rocky, dusty road of the south entrance, we could only be impressed by the tremendous vistas and the apparent inhospitable nature.

Reed places the Puebloan society in a historical perspective as part of a Medieval Historical series, the *Greenwood Guides to Historic Events of the Medieval World*, defined as a period from 500 to 1500 A.D. Chaco would peak in the mislabeled "Dark Ages," beginning with the fall of the Roman Empire and continuing until the advent of the Italian and English renaissances.




This book differs from the other series' segments, whose historical events are based on long-established historical records. In contrast, Reed's study of a pre-literate society is based on the original reconstruction of the Puebloan Indian society of Chaco. He focuses on its leaders, rituals, craft specialists, and commoners during its flourishing in the eleventh and twelfth centuries.

The author deals with the challenge that the absence of written aboriginal languages in the Americas means, and that written chronologies of people's events, processes, and lives do not exist, making understanding America's pre-European past difficult. Thematic chapters guide the reader to the emergence of Puebloan society, its cultural and environmental settings, and the Pueblo people—other chapters detail how the area was settled and where the people eventually dispersed.

An annotated timeline provides references to critical dates and events. Biographical sketches reveal the lives of those who studied and formed what we know about Puebloan Society, and twenty annotated primary and secondary documents guide the reader through the Chacoan-related material. A glossary of terms is helpful, as are the illustrations and several maps. The author also recommends sources for future inquiry, websites, videos, and print.

The biography of Neil Judd was fascinating, as his name came up many times during our visit. He brought a detailed, analytical, organized approach to Chaco Canyon fieldwork in the 1920s, and his reports still serve as the primary source documents for the Pueblo Bonito and Pueblo del Arroyo. After the National Geographic-sponsored fieldwork at Chaco ended in 1927, he returned to Washington. He was caught up in other projects, so the first comprehensive report on Chaco was not published until 1954, almost thirty years after his fieldwork ended.

This book provided an invaluable overview of the Puebloan Society with multiple materials and resources, making our visit to the Chaco Canyon much more insightful and productive.



With today's Supreme Court ruling rejecting affirmative action at U.S. colleges, <u>How The Word Is Passed</u> by Clint Smith becomes a must-read, as the author examines the legacy of slavery in America and how history and memory continue to shape our everyday lives. Not surprisingly, this New York Times bestseller is one of the top banned books today.

The author begins the book with a quote from **Frederick Douglass's** *The Nation's Problem*:

Our past was slavery. We cannot recur to it with any sense of complacency or composure. The history of it is a record of stripes, a revelation of agony. It is written in characters of blood. Its breath is a sigh, its voice a groan, and we turn from it with a shudder. The duty of today is to meet the questions that confront us with intelligence and courage.

Clint Smith starts this journey in his hometown of New Orleans. He leads us on a memorable tour of six monuments and landmarks, which offer an intergenerational story of how slavery has been central in shaping our nation's collective history and ourselves.

A well-researched exploration of the legacy of slavery, the author covers stories of the past and the story behind this month's celebration of Juneteenth. The chapter is entitled "Galveston Island." The author reveals that the Emancipation Proclamation only applied to eleven Confederate states, and Texas was one of those states that ignored what it demanded. Black American second-class citizenship was recodified through Jim Crow laws limiting voting rights.

The celebration of **Juneteenth** became dangerous for Black Southerners. In 2010 Black Texans represented 12% of the population and 32% of those incarcerated. In 1979, Texas became the first state to create a holiday in honor of Black emancipation, and this chapter included some critical lessons for actual Texas lawmakers trying to erase history from the classroom.

Clint tells his own family's experience with slavery over the years and how its legacy still impacts their lives:

My grandparents' stories are my inheritance; each is an heirloom I carry. Each one is a monument to an era that still courses through my grandfather's veins. Each story is a memorial that still sits in my grandmother's bones.

...I think of how decades of racial violence have shaped everything we see, but sometimes I forget its impact on those beside me. I forget that many men and women who spat on the Little Rock Nine are still alive. I forget that so many of the people who threw rocks at Dr. King are still voting in our elections...."

The author concludes, "The history of slavery is the history of the United States. It was not peripheral to our founding; it was central to it. It is not irrelevant to our contemporary society; it created it. This history is in our soil, it is in our policies, and it must, too, be in our memories." Winner of the National Book Critics Circle Award for Nonfiction





Three Punctuation Errors That Plague Me

By Jennifer Wren

I've just spent hours doing tedious global "Find and Replace" searches to correct several punctuation errors that continue to torment me. I look up these same rules on average about once a year and then find myself making the same mistakes over and over. I am hoping that looking them up yet again and writing them down here for you will finally cement them in my brain!



- 1. SINGLE SPACES BETWEEN SENTENCES: My son, who teaches writing at a university in New York City, admonishes, "Mom, the use of two spaces at the end of a sentence is archaic." Oh gee, now I'm not only old, I'm archaic! Here is the RULE: after a period, question mark, exclamation mark, quotation mark, or ellipsis (anything that signifies the end of a sentence) USE ONLY A SINGLE SPACE, not two as you may have been taught in typing class. In fact, if you use two spaces it automatically dates you as having learned to type on a typewriter prior to the advent of computerized word processing. Yes, I am that old. [Hint: To autocorrect these, do a "search and replace." In the search bar, type a period followed by two spaces, and in the replace bar, type a period with one space. Repeat this process using a question mark, exclamation mark, quotation mark and ellipsis.]
- 2. LOWER CASE DIALOGUE TAG: You can find people who argue this until their faces turn red and their hands curl into fists, but the rule nevertheless is a RULE: After a dialogue fragment OR sentence, start the tag with a LOWER CASE LETTER (unless it starts with a proper name). Example: "That's a bunch of crap," he said. I've even had MS Word autocorrect and put in a capital, so I go back to the Internet and confirm: use a lowercase! BTW, periods always go INSIDE the quotation marks and most often, commas do as well. Semicolons and colons are never placed inside quotation marks unless they are part of the direct quote.

Remember, if dialogue ends in a period but has a dialogue tag added, switch to a comma. Check the example: "That's a bunch of crap." he said. You'll note that this is incorrect because the dialogue ends in a period with a tag added. Switch to a comma as shown in the previous paragraph. However, look at the following example: "That's a bunch of crap!" he said. This is correct. Don't you just love English?

3. PUNCTUATING AN ELLIPSIS: If you want to indicate a pause, pregnant or otherwise, you may use an ellipsis. RULE: It depends. In most fiction, an ellipsis is THREE dots in a row, no spaces between, with spaces before the ellipsis and after it. The last space is eliminated if the ellipsis ends at a quotation mark. Example: "But I thought ..." You can see a space before the ellipsis but not after, since it ends at a quotation mark. Take another example: "But I thought ... you knew." In this case, there is a space both before and after the ellipsis, but no spaces between. (Note that if you added a dialogue tag to that quote, you'd switch the period after "knew" to a comma.) In nonfiction and formal writing, you may see ellipses written with spaces before, between, and after them. They are still three dots (although in certain circumstances there may be a period before or after the ellipsis, which makes it look as if it has four dots). Everyone warns against overusing this handy little device, as it becomes very tiresome for a reader to see that a character, or worse, all the characters can't seem to speak in a full sentence! Example: "I ... don't know ... maybe ... it's just that I ... you know ..."

I hope this helps some of you and if you want to argue with me, that's okay too. Maybe I'm still getting it wrong, but I tried to find at least 3 sources to confirm each rule above.



I love Pat Conroy; as one reviewer put it: "Few writers write as well, but none as beautifully." He has a way of making everything so real, so earthy, so gut-wrenchingly emotional. <u>South of Broad</u> is one such example. Set in Charleston, South Carolina, against the backdrop of high school romance, murder, suicide, Hurricane Camille, loss of loved ones and sexual predators, the book enfolds you in a lifelong friendship from High School through later years. The bond between this group of friends remains strong throughout the decades, with each one willing to sacrifice, in adulthood, to find one of their childhood friends. A lost lamb riddled with AIDS, they hope to bring him back to die in his Charleston home surrounded by love.

The author obviously knows Charleston very well. As someone who lived as a teen in the Carolinas, I can relate to the sights, sounds and smells and attest to their authenticity. *South of Broad* is hilariously funny, painfully heartbreaking, an upper and a downer all wrapped into one. In the end, however, you can't help but believe that the world is a beautiful place because there are still good people in it, friends who will love you forever no matter your sins.

Don't Be Shy ... RUN!

With this issue we are launching the Arizona Authors Board Election and asking YOU to run for office, volunteering in whatever capacity you feel is right for you (and don't worry, we'll help). There are so many reasons why this association is important to me and why I volunteer my time. Since I attended the very first meeting in 2008, the Arizona Authors Association has inspired me with its history, its people, and its dedication to helping other writers grow.

Toby Heathcotte was the first person I met in the Association. I walked into a meeting not knowing what to expect, and she came up to me, handed me a flyer and welcomed me. She was the president at the time and hosted the event. Past president Vijaya Schartz presented the workshop into which I had stumbled.

Vijaya gave me enough material that night to fill half my notebook. I wasn't a newbie to the book world ... I had been a copywriter/editor for Demand Studios and other publishers and had run my own editing business. But my head had been stuck in the editing side for so long that I'd forgotten some tricks for the creative writing side of my job ... tricks that I could share with my clients and use in my own books. I was hooked on the Arizona Authors Association that first night, thanks to the good fortune of meeting Toby, Vijaya, and another wonderful member, Cherie Lee.

Cherie volunteered as editor of the Arizona Authors Association newsletter. In 2013 or 14, I became her proofreader and we produced one of the best newsletters in the state. I remained in that capacity with her until 2016, when we were both surreptitiously kicked out of the Arizona Authors Association, along with Toby and Vijaya, by the new president and her husband, whom she had named vice-president. For the four of us, it was a devastating blow to see the Arizona Authors Association fall apart before our eyes. Soon after, the website went down. Eventually, the newsletter was shut down. The legacy of Boyé De Mente and David Rich, who had founded this organization in 1978, was being taken down brick by brick, and it was painful for us to watch without the ability to change it.

Since the president had threatened us with legal action if we continued to voice our concerns to the membership, I didn't want to get bogged down in a legal mess with a former attorney. I withdrew from the fray and eventually moved to Maine. But the Arizona Authors Association was never far from my heart.

Imagine my surprise in early 2019 when Toby, as the Arizona Authors Association Vice President, contacted me. She, Vijaya, Cherie and I had all been reinstated. She asked me if I would consider restarting the Arizona Authors newsletter as its editor. I was sorry that Cherie could not continue in that role, but promised that I would do my mentor proud. (Cherie, I hope I have done right by you, these past four years. You had an eye for precise layouts and aesthetics.)

Between Toby, Jane, myself, and many, many others, we have restored the wonderful 45-year legacy of the Arizona Authors Association. David Rich is still a member; he was the attorney who drew up our first Arizona Corporation Commission paperwork to found the organization. Although Boye De Mente died in 2017, I hope he is looking down on us and approves what we have done. There is a long article on Wikipedia attesting to his colorful history as an author, editor, and publisher, but I have to believe his greatest accomplishment is with us, you and me and every member of our incredible organization.

Please know, however, that we can't continue without more volunteers. Toby must slow down for health reasons; Jane

and I are being run ragged trying to do everything that this organization needs to run smoothly. We cannot handle another year without more board officers, both in leadership and support, to take on key roles. 

Will Bernadette find the unconventional life she seeks? Or will their entire world end as states secede and war creeps ever closer?



The Weighmaster







A Writer's Tip

From Karen Odden

When attending a conference, volunteer, prepare, and take advantage of all the opportunities. Conferences are some of the best ways to build your community of practice as a writer. Even if you are an unpublished author, or if your debut is not quite out, you can still participate meaningfully. Volunteer to check people in at registration (a great way to meet people!), or offer to serve as the "timer" on a panel.

Prepare for the conference by looking over the list of attending authors, agents, and editors. Pro tip: often the best time to approach them is *not* immediately before or after their panel (they'll be swamped by other people); but find them at breakfast, or in the book signing room, and you'll likely be able to chat for a few minutes. Have your 30-second elevator pitch down, so it rolls off your tongue even if you're nervous. No joke - I know people who have met people in elevators ... and it's led to good things.

Lastly, be sure to take advantage of all the opportunities. Don't sit with all your friends at breakfast; instead, approach a table and meet some new people. Sign up for critique sessions, fairly informal 20-minute opportunities for feedback on one of your chapters. Chat with the person sitting to your left or right while you're waiting for a panel to begin. Have your bookmarks or business cards (with your blog or your podcast, short story or website, if you haven't published a book yet) ready to hand out. Many of us writers are introverts by nature, but be willing to step a little outside your comfort zone.
